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INTRODUCTION

This is the companion volume for the report entitled Capturing community members' bushfire experiences: Interviews with residents following the 12 January 2014 Parkerville (WA) Fire prepared by Professor Jim McLennan. The current document presents findings from the online survey developed to complement the community interviews undertaken and detailed by Professor McLennan in that report.

Both pieces of work were undertaken as part of the study conducted by the Bushfire and Natural Hazards Cooperative Research Centre (BNHCRC) for the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) of Western Australia following the bushfire in the Parkerville area on 12 January 2014.

The purpose of that study was to assist DFES to learn as much as possible about residents' prior understandings of bushfire safety and risk, and their experiences during the fires, thus contributing to improved community bushfire safety in the future. The reader is referred to the aforementioned report for an overview of the circumstances of that fire and background to the study.

The online survey was included in the broader study to enable those who were not at home at the time the interview teams were in the field and unable to avail themselves of the opportunity to participate in the study though a telephone interview to have their experiences recorded and considered. The online survey was open to all residents in the Shire of Mundaring from May to early July 2014.

Despite wide promotion of the survey, the number of respondents who ultimately completed the questionnaire (58) was small. This means that the results should be used carefully and should be seen as a glimpse of the views of a self-selected group of Shire of Mundaring residents who are particularly interested in bushfire-related matters.

METHODOLOGY

DEVELOPMENT OF THE SURVEY TOOL

The online survey, the results of which are presented here, was developed by the BNHCRC staff in collaboration with the DFES Community Engagement Branch and staff from the Shire of Mundaring. The questions and the survey tool were designed in an iterative process involving members of each of these organisations with the question design overseen by Professor McLennan.

As the first stage of the process (undertaken in parallel with the development of the interview check sheets used in the community interviews), questions were selected from similar studies undertaken by the Bushfire CRC in Victoria, Tasmania and New South Wales. These were then reviewed by the DFES and Shire staff to align with their key areas of interest and local context. Details were reviewed by the BNHCRC team and Professor McLennan to avoid leading questions and ensure an unbiased survey.

The survey was then entered into the commercially available tool Survey Monkey®. Prior to launch, the survey was tested by staff from the three organisations (DFES, Shire of Mundaring and BNHCRC) and refined to address ambiguity and enable improved navigation between sections. As part of the review process, it was identified the survey was quite long (taking some testers up to 30 minutes to complete) and there was the potential for a drop-off in completion of later questions. After discussion, it was agreed to proceed with the full range of questions as each of them addressed issues of importance to the DFES team.

A copy of the final survey is included as Appendix A. Frequency tables for individual questions are provided as Appendix B.

The target population for this online survey was the residents of the Shire of Mundaring threatened by the fire in the Parkerville area. Based on this, the combined team decided the principal access point to the survey should be the Shire of Mundaring webpage. Links to the survey were provided on the BNHCRC, Bushfire CRC and DFES websites.

Flyers distributed as part of the community interviewing fieldwork advised residents of the availability of the online survey. Residents unable to participate in the interviews were encouraged to complete the online survey to assist DFES in learning from their experiences. The survey was further advertised through local initiatives (including social media) arranged by Shire and DFES staff.

The survey was open from 7 May to 7 July 2014.



SURVEY PARTICIPATION AND DATA ANALYSIS

Despite the efforts of the combined organisations, the number of responses to the survey was low with only 67 participants commencing and 58 completing the survey from a population of 5,323 usual residents.¹

Owing to the small sample, these survey results should be seen as being informative only and should not be relied upon as definitive statements of what community members did or experienced during this fire event. Notwithstanding this, the researchers believe these results can be seen as an 'upper boundary' of bushfire safety awareness and preparedness as it is reasonable to assume that those who responded to the survey represent that portion of the community who are relatively more interested in and aware of bushfire-related matters.

It is worth noting that 17 (one third) of the respondents to the survey indicated they had experienced damage to their home or property or had lost pets or livestock owing to the fire. Of these, only four indicated their home had been destroyed or sustained major damage.

Data has been analysed and presented in a relatively straightforward way using simple tabulations and graphs. Responses have not been differentiated by age, gender or other independent variables owing to the small sample size. Similarly, tests of significance have not been conducted.

All respondents who started indicated they agreed with the terms and conditions (Question 1) but nine respondents dropped out after Question 2 about where they lived, giving a base of 58 respondents. Analysis shows seven of those who dropped out were from areas other than the target regions of Parkerville, Stoneville and Mount Helena. After the initial drop-out, the number of responses remained largely consistent with respondents addressing relevant questions. This indicates that survey fatigue was not as significant as that reported in previous online surveys of bushfire-affected communities.²

RESULTS

This section provides some detail of key characteristics of respondents and their answers to a selection of the questions included in the survey. As indicated above frequency distributions are included for all questions in Appendix B. Data sets have been provided to DFES for more detailed analysis however the small sample size means any such analysis must be treated with extreme caution.

PERSONAL AND HOUSEHOLD CHARACTERISTICS

Geographic Distribution

Respondents were first asked whether they lived or had properties in the area affected by the Parkerville fire that is the subject of the current study.

As indicated above, 67 respondents answered this question. Of these, 16 (23.9%) indicated they were from the Parkerville area, 27 (40.3%) from the Stoneville area and 17 (25.4%) from the Mount Helena area, seven respondents indicated they were from other areas. The seven from 'other areas, along with two additional initial respondents subsequently dropped out of the survey.

Demographic Characteristics and Household Structure

In this section the demographic characteristics of the respondents have been compared to those of the resident population based on the 2011 Census of Population and Housing³.

A total of 58 respondents answered the questions about their gender and age. The proportion of women responding to this survey, like those participating in the community interviews, is slightly higher than that found in the general community. The age of the respondents is slightly younger than the general population with an estimated mean of 45 years. This provides a counter-balance to the interviews, where the mean age of respondents was 57 years. Gender and age distribution of respondents (compared with the local community) is presented in Table 1.

Table 2 shows the employment status of respondents. In contrast to the interviews, which had an under-representation of those in full-time or part-time employment (28% and 14% respectively), compared to the community of the area, a high proportion of the respondents to the online survey (74%) were in some form of paid employment.

The next section of the survey asked a number of questions about dependents. These questions are asked because the presence or absence of dependents is generally considered an important influencer on people's decision-making. Key results are provided in Table 3 below.

It can be noted that 37% of respondents indicated that either they or another member of the household were current or former members of the local Volunteer Bushfire Brigade or Volunteer Fire and Rescue. Twenty-five per cent indicated they were current members.

HOME AND COMMUNITY

Characteristics of the Property

The third section of the survey asked a series of questions about the particular property and the general community. These variables have been found previously to influence risk perception and general preparedness actions.

Respondents indicated the properties (in the Parkerville area and) on which they lived were predominately the main family home (98%). The majority (91%) were owned (with or without a mortgage).

Properties were roughly equally split between those on residential-sized blocks (56%) and those on small acreages (up to 10 ha) (41%); only 4% of respondents indicated they were living on properties over 10 ha in size.

Nearly 50% of respondents indicated the nearest bushland or scrub was either next door or only a block away; a further 20% indicated that it was across a road or other break.

Engagement with the Community

After considering the characteristics of the property, the survey then asked a series of questions about the level of engagement with the local community.




FIGURE 1 NUMBER OF YEARS LIVED IN THE AREA

Figure 1, above shows respondents were equally as likely to be new to the area or to be long-term residents, with 25% having lived there for less than 5 years.

Similarly, respondents were evenly spread between knowing a large number of other community members (21% indicating they knew more than 50 people in the community well) and having fewer contacts (24.1% having indicating they knew less than 10 other people in the community reasonably well). Nearly 40% of respondents indicated they interacted with neighbours at least once a week.

Most (78%) indicated they felt they could get help from neighbours if they needed it.

Sixty-three per cent indicated that neighbours co-operated when there were issues or problems (such as a need to clear overgrown vegetation) in the area.

The most common descriptor of the community (55%) used by the respondents was that 'people generally get along and talk to each other'.

Perception of Bushfire Risk

Of the respondents, 22% had never experienced a bushfire before. Twenty-five per cent of respondents had experienced a bushfire in the past 12 months and a similar proportion had experienced a bushfire between one and five years ago.




FIGURE 2 LEVEL OF PERCEIVED BUSHFIRE RISK

Figure 2 shows the perceived level of bushfire risk respondents recalled they held prior to the fire of 12 January 2014. Most of the respondents indicated they felt the risk of bushfire in the neighbourhood was high or very high. No respondents considered the risk of bushfire to be lower than medium. There were no significant differences in the demographic characteristics of those who felt the risk of bushfire was medium/high to those who felt it was very high/extreme.

BEING PREPARED FOR BUSHFIRE

Bushfire Plans

The majority of respondents (91%) indicated that prior to the January 2014 bushfire, they had a plan as to what they and their household would do in the event of a bushfire. The majority of these (67%) indicated that this was a plan that they 'had in mind' but was not written down. Two respondents provided a reason as to why they had not prepared a plan: one was because they perceived it was 'too hard' to put one together; the second was because the resident was very new to the area.

All of those who indicated they did not have a plan (either written or in mind) were in some form of employment but there were no other discernible differentiating demographic characteristics. Respondents without a plan were evenly distributed across the perceived levels of bushfire risk.

Table 4 below shows that those who were intending to 'wait and see, then decide' when threatened by a bushfire generally did not have a written plan. Based on the survey responses, written plans were most likely to be found where respondents indicated that one or more members of the household planned to stay and defend.

Ninety-two per cent of respondents also indicated that where they had a plan (whether this be written or just in mind), they discussed it with others in the family. Thirty-two per cent had discussed it with neighbours or friends. Nearly two-thirds (64%) had considered what to do with pets and just over a quarter (26%) had a backup plan.

Actions Taken to Prepare for a Possible Bushfire

Regardless of whether or not they had a bushfire plan in mind or written out, respondents were asked what actions, from a defined list, they had done to prepare their house, themselves or their family for bushfire. The most frequent response to this question was that the respondent had or had read a copy of a bushfire preparedness document. This might be the DFES publications Homeowners' Bushfire Survival Manual; Prepare. Act. Survive; or the Shire of Mundaring Fire and Burning booklet.

The majority of respondents indicated they had cleared gutters (78%) or a space around the house (72%). Fifty-eight per cent indicated they had a safe destination and access route mapped out and 40% indicated they had an emergency kit checked and ready.

Approximately one-third of respondents indicated they had participated in some form of bushfire preparedness activity in the past 12 months. The most frequently mentioned activities were: attendance at a community bushfire meeting (19.6%) or visiting a Volunteer Bushfire Brigade stand at a community event (15.2%).

In addition, as shown in Table 5, below many residents recalled seeing or hearing campaigns that promoted bushfire safety and nearly 80% indicated that these (or the events that they had attended) had assisted them in preparing themselves or their property for a possible bushfire.

The next section of the questionnaire explored respondents' awareness of the Fire Danger rating scale and their confidence in using it. Ninety-six per cent of respondents indicated they were aware of the Fire Danger rating scale, with the majority of these (82%) indicating they felt very confident they understood what the scale was telling them. Sixty per cent indicated they checked the Fire Danger rating scale daily or more often and at least 75% indicated they checked it at least once a week. Sixty-seven per cent indicated they could recall the Fire Danger rating for 12 January 2014.

FIRE OF 12 JANUARY 2014

Having worked through their general bushfire awareness and preparedness, respondents were then asked to think specifically about the events of 12 January 2014 when fire impacted on the area.

Responses to the 12 January Fire

The 12 January 2014 was a Sunday and most respondents (78%) indicated they were at home when they first heard about the fire threatening their home or property. Half of those who were not at home endeavoured to return, with all of them achieving this within 15 minutes.

Respondents became aware of the fire in a wide variety of ways, most frequently from sensory perceptions: seeing (35.8%) or smelling (7.5%) smoke, hearing sirens (13.2%) or hearing or seeing a helicopter overhead (5.7%) were the first indications of the fire. For some, however, the first warning of the fire was official notification by police, State Emergency Service (SES) or firefighters (collectively 9.4%), or an official warning via email, SMS or phone (collectively 11.3%). Visual cues along with the Emergency Warning alerts were the major triggers for people in the household to act.

Once they became aware of the fire in the area, respondents variously elected to leave, to stay and defend (all or some household members), or to wait and see before making a decision. Seventy per cent of respondents indicated the main reason they did this was because they were 'following their plan'.

Table 6 shows the decisions respondents made upon becoming aware of the fire.

Despite their initial decision, nearly eighty per cent of respondents indicated that ultimately on the day of the fire, one or more members of their household left the property because of the fire. Forty-two per cent of respondents indicated members of their household stayed on the property during the fire. In response to an open-ended question, most of these indicated the reasons for staying were either to defend or protect their property or because they did not feel under direct threat.

As shown in table 7 (above) where household members left, this was variously well before the fire was in the area (11%), upon becoming aware of the fire (39.6%), once the fire was close (20.8%), or at the last minute (5.7%). The majority of those who left (63.0%) went to family, friends or neighbours. As shown in table 8 most indicated they felt that leaving was necessary (88.1%) and the right thing to do.

Sources of Information during the 12 January Bushfire




FIGURE 3 SOURCES OF INFORMATION DURING 12 JANUARY PARKERVILLE FIRE

Previous studies have shown community members often seek additional information when they become aware of a fire in their area.⁴ As in those previous studies, figure 3 shows the fire agency (DFES) website was an important source of such information. Social media was also an important source of information during the fires.

Respondents varied in what they saw as the most reliable sources of information, with their own view or information from those they knew in the fire services being the considered the most reliable (both 19.6% of responses). Social media was considered the next most reliable (17.6%), with radio and the DFES website also being held in high regard. The latter sources were however identified as being the preferred way of receiving information, with nearly 60% of the respondents indicating this to be 'the way they most like to receive information'.

PREPARING FOR FUTURE FIRES

Respondents were asked how well they felt they had been prepared for these fires. Most (74%) felt they had been well or adequately prepared. None of the respondents indicated they were not at all prepared.

Despite this, many indicated the experience of the fires had led to some changes in their planning. Table 9 shows that many have now turned their mental plan into a written one and others think that although they don't have a plan, they need one. It is interesting to note the proportion of respondents who acknowledge that they didn't have a plan in this section of the survey (16.6%) is somewhat higher than that indicated in response to earlier questions (9%).

Finally Table 10 shows the reported breakdown of the intended actions in the event of a bushfire have changed somewhat since the experiences of January 2014.



Q5. Are you? (gender)









Q40. If you were not at home when you first heard about fires threatening your home did you try to get home at that time?







Q46. Which of the following is the way you most like to receive information about fire in your area?










